Understand context

Key outcome: A clear understanding of the internal and external forces shaping organizational IT priorities.

Actions to take:

Gather an initial list of external factors, such as emerging AI laws, expiring relief funds and student device restrictions, to prompt your planning discussions.

Partner with governing boards and organizational leadership to build a shared understanding of how these shifting forces alter everyday school operations.

Use these discussions to map out the broad legal, operational and instructional risks that your upcoming technology strategy must address.

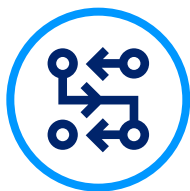

Deploy multilingual, mobile-friendly engagement platforms that comply with accessibility standards to maintain community trust during policy shifts.

Monitor progress and adapt

Key outcome: Continuous visibility into how the plan is working so leaders can change technology priorities as the organization’s needs evolve.

Actions to take:

Pinpoint the most critical external shifts, such as new privacy regulations or funding adjustments, to track on a regular basis.

Schedule routine technology reviews with organizational leadership to keep project actions aligned with classroom requirements.

Update the technology roadmap and rollout schedules to respond quickly to new budget limits or sudden cyberthreats.

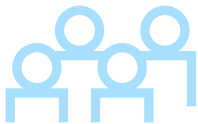

Who needs to be involved?

The most successful K-12 organizations establish cross-functional teams to manage disruptive change. This layout expands beyond the technology department to include leadership from both the education and business sides of the organization.



Superintendent and Cabinet

Provide the overall executive vision to keep academic priorities and organizationwide business operations working toward the same goals.

Chief Academic Officer and Curriculum Leaders

Ensure that all new digital tools, software and AI applications directly support regional curriculum and educational standards.

Chief Financial Officer and Business Managers ↗

Balance tight budgets, optimize software licensing costs and build multiyear funding plans for infrastructure projects.

Chief Information Officer and Technology Team ↗

Integrate compliance, infrastructure planning, security and AI oversight into a single, unified IT strategy that ensures organizational resilience, while aligning all technology initiatives directly with the organization’s educational mission and classroom goals.

School-Level Teachers and Administrators

Implement digital safety rules, device rollout schedules and policy guardrails directly on school campuses and in classrooms.
